Kairos Youth Worker Summit

Last June 15-17, 2018, Kairos Youth Worker Summit was held in University of Saint Mary of the Lake, Mundelein, Illinois. It is a beautiful seminary in an expansive grounds with a breathtaking view of the lake inviting you to prayer and reflection of God's splendor and goodness.

Family of Faith delegates included Rex Poyaoan, Meeko Natural, Angelica Mowery, Gia Guevarra, Mara Cabangon, Peter Castillo, and me. It was also attended by Triumph of the Cross, Families for Christ, City on the Hill, to name a few.

The Summit sessions covered Kairos' Youth Work Principles, Gender and Sexuality Case Studies, Strategic Investment in Upper Classmen, SWOT Culture Evaluation, Vision and Worship, and Regional Programs and Evaluation.

The highlights that struck me the most as shared by Kairos North America Director, James Munk, and Mike Shaughnessy, Kairos International and Regional Director were -

1. The youth are the most underutilized resource. They are given so much but less is demanded of them.

The parents are one of our greatest ally in our youth work but could also be one of the greatest threat in preventing it as well. They have the power to raise our youth, not to be safe, but become radical lifelong disciples who will either be missionaries, saints or martyrs. Additionally, it is the coordinators's job to get the parents on board and realize their critical role.

2. A proposal on Kairos Youth Worker Training Curriculum which will be a series of recorded talks and made available online. It is very invaluable because our youth workers will be further equipped with their service and will approach guidelines that are identical and consistent with SOS communities.

The weekend was packed with a lot of learnings, and oftentimes, overwhelming because it was my first to attend a youth worker summit. I was overwhelmed with awe in how much prayer and work entailed KAIROS events like YES Retreat, GAP, etc. I was overwhelmed with gratitude to see countless young men and women exuberant in their service. Lastly, I was overwhelmed by God's love and faithfulness as His Spirit sets in motion all those seen and unseen ways in gathering all His children under His reign.

Young Professional Outreach Training



n July 21, 2018, the Sword of the Spirit hosted a Young Professional Outreach (YPO) Training at the Servants of the Word Brotherhood Center in Chelsea Michigan. A team of YPO workers from Family of Faith flew over to Michigan to participate. The team composed of Pam Farrales, Angelica Mowery, Meeko Natural and I were joined by about 30 other YPO workers from the Michigan area. I initially thought before deciding to participate that I might be too old for a YPO event.

was the 2nd oldest guy, next only to Mike Shaughnessy – the speaker. But I wouldn't have it any other way, because it means that the young professionals are stepping up to the plate to evangelize their age group. It was inspiring to witness the passion of these young evangelists and how serious they are in doing their part in building God's kingdom.

The workshop talked about the challenges and circumstances facing young professionals. We discussed the reality that adulthood or maturity comes much later nowadays as opposed to 40 years ago. In the 1970s, maturity happens from the age of 20-24. Nowadays, it's happening 22-28. It's not only getting delayed, it's also taking longer.

We talked about how young professionals are newly graduates and maybe in a new job and in a new state and how they might be looking to establish relationships. We talked about practical ways of evangelizing but specifically targeting the young professionals. One very successful program in another Sword of the Spirit community is the "Taco Tuesdays". It's a very popular event to meet other young adults, enjoy good food and build friendships. Once you have events that people show up to regularly, you will have opportunities to witness to them. We were likewise given tips on how to become intentional in our conversations, hopefully leading people to open up themselves by our genuine concern for them.

One important take-away for me participating in this training was the understanding that young adults have their own pace – different from somebody like me who is married with 3 children. They prefer spontaneity and don't like being boxed in. If we intend to capture young professions into our way of life, we need to understand their pace and understand what goes on in their head.

Lastly, it's worth mentioning that the workshop ended with a Lord's day celebration. We always talked about being a community of communities, and for me, it was amazing how we all shared the Lord's day table reciting the same ceremony. It felt like being with relatives even if I've only met them all for the first time. This is what it means to be part of the Sword of the Spirit with a common way of life. It makes me appreciate that we're not in this on our own. We are all partners here in building God's kingdom. Praise God!
